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Parent Tips

Finding out your child has a disability may bring about strong emotions such as feelings of guilt, denial, anger, fear for your child's future successes, worry about family concerns or doubt about what to do.

Reach out. Don't expect to know everything or be able to do everything by yourself. This booklet will lead you to information, places, people and/or services to which you can reach.

- d Learn all you can about your child's disability.
 - Understand acronyms and definitions.
 - Utilize books and online resources.
 - o Access national and local support groups.
 - Consider participation in disability awareness groups.
 - Be cautious of quick cures and miracle treatments.
- Establish a working partnership: collaborate often with the school team (teachers, counselors, principal, nurse, related service providers). Both you and the school may request meetings.
 - Regular and consistent communication with the school team is an important way to monitor your child's progress and ensure that concerns are dealt with as they arise, rather than being allowed to escalate or go unattended.
 - Attend all meetings- parents are an integral part of the team.
 - Maximize your conferences by keeping complete records of previous conferences and decisions.
 - o Provide insight about the level of difficulty, ease and satisfaction with which your child experiences school.
 - Write down your questions and concerns before the meeting- be sure to identify your child's strengths as well as needs. Also be prepared to share your ideas for your child's program.
 - Keep careful notes and do not be afraid to ask for clarification if you do not understand something.
 - O Summarize plans for next steps and the role you will play. Build trust and let the other members of the team know how much you appreciate their efforts.
 - Encourage the development of healthy self- esteem and reinforce home and school learning.
 - Listen to your child's hopes, fears, doubts and dreams.
 - o Discuss events at school and talk about what their disability is and isn't.
 - o Give praise for little and big successes.
 - Save past work and point out improvements.
 - o Go out and have fun with your child doing activities that are fun for both you and your child.
 - O Let your child help around the house with appropriate tasks that help build confidence, for example; baking, cleaning, organizing, setting and clearing that table, caring for pets, or putting away groceries.
 - O Give clear instructions verbally and on cue cards on how to do each task.
 - Set up routines for dinner, TV, homework and bedtime.

Glossary of Special Education Terms

- 1. **Accommodations** Techniques and materials that enable a student to participate in the educational program to assist the student being able to learn and show what they know without changing the basic curriculum.
- Assistive Technology Device- A piece of equipment or product which is used to
 increase, maintain, or improve the way a child with a disability interacts and
 communicates with the world around them. This does not include a medical device that is
 surgically implanted or the replacement of such a device.
- 3. **Assistive Technology Services** Services to help a child with a disability use an assistive technology device. These services include evaluating the needs, providing the device, and then training the child and others to use the device.
- Advocacy- Communicating and promoting the rights, needs and interests of the child on behalf of the child.
- 5. **Assessment** Finding out the child's strengths and weaknesses for the purpose of educational planning.
- 6. **Auditory Discrimination** The ability to tell the difference between words and sounds that are similar.
- 7. **Chapter 14-** The Pennsylvania state law pertaining to the delivery of special education services and programs. It is referred to as regulations or is sometimes called rules.
- 8. Child With A Disability-A child evaluated as having mental retardation, a hearing impairment including deafness, a speech or language impairment, a visual impairment including blindness, emotional disturbance, and orthopedic impairment, autism, traumatic brain injury, other health impairment, a specific learning disability, deaf-blindness, or multiple disabilities, and who as a result of the disability needs special education and related services.
- 9. **Compliance Complaint** A complaint filed with the state department of education or local school district by someone who believes an educational law has been broken.
- 10. Due Process-The procedures that parents can use to disagree with the decisions of school district officials concerning special education. The parent is informed of this right by written notice, which describes the options of an informal meeting, mediation, or formal hearing and appeals.
- 11. **Evaluation-** The process used to determine if a child has a disability and if special education is needed. The evaluation looks at how the child learns, the kinds of instruction that would be successful, and the kinds of instruction that have been tried and have resulted in success.
- 12. **Evaluation Report (ER)-** The report that is complied and written by the evaluation team. It describes all of the information gathered from the team members, including the results of assessment. From the report, the evaluation team determines the student's eligibility and need for special education programs.
- 13. **Evaluation Team-** A team of educators, other professional individuals, and the child's parents that review all formal testing of a child and all other evaluation material. The evaluation team must issue a written report stating if the child is a child with a disability who needs special education and making suggestions about the programs and services needed.
- 14. Free Appropriate Public Education (FAPE)- The idea that public school students with disabilities are entitled by law to an education program (based on an IEP) and related services to meet unique educational needs free of charge to the parents.
- 15. **Functional Behavior Assessment** a process to collect information and data to try to determine why a student may be displaying a certain behavior or pattern of behaviors.

16. General Education-Regular classroom instruction.

17. **Individualized Education Program (IEP)** - The plan written by the IEP team (including parents) that specifically describes the programs and services necessary for a free appropriate public education for the child with a disability.

18. Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA '04) - The federal law which governs the provision of special education services and the rights of parents of a child

with a disability.

- 19. **Informed Consent-**Written agreements stating parents have been informed and understand the purpose and intent of special education evaluations and service decisions. This is voluntary and may be withdrawn.
- 20. **Intelligence Quotient (IQ)-**A score that indicates a person's general cognitive (mental) ability; average range is 85-115.
- 21. Least Restrictive Environment (LRE) -Students eligible for special education will be educated to the maximum extent appropriate with students who are not disabled.
- 22. **Manifestation Determination** a review of all relevant information in the student's file, including the child's IEP, any teacher observations, and any relevant information provided by the parents to determine if the conduct in question was caused by, or had a direct and substantial relationship to, the child's disability or if the conduct in question was the direct result of the school's failure to implement the child's IEP.
- 23. **Notice Of Recommended Educational Placement (NOREP)-**The form issued to parents to inform them of the placement recommended by the IEP team.
- 24. Parent-A natural parent, adoptive parent, surrogate parent, or foster parent who has been assigned education decision-making rights. The term may also apply to an individual acting in place of a natural or adoptive parent (including grandparent or other relative) with whom the child lives and who has educational decision-making rights, or an individual who is legally responsible for the child.
- 25. **Positive Behavior Support** techniques and interventions to ensure that all students are free from demeaning treatment, the use of aversive techniques, and the unreasonable use of restraints.
- 26. **Primary Language (Non-English)**-Spoken language or another form of communication (including sign language) that the child learned first or that is used in the child's home.
- 27. **Referral-**Written request for an evaluation to see if a child has a disability that could require special education services.
- 28. **Related Services-**Services that are necessary to provide specially designed instruction to ensure the child benefits from the special education programs. Examples are special transportation, counseling, school health services, and physical therapy.
- 29. **Special Education-**Special instruction designed to meet the unique needs of children with disabilities whose educational needs can't be met through changes in the regular instructional program.
- 30. Specially Designed Instruction (SDI)- Adapting the content, methods, or delivery of the instruction as is appropriate based on the unique needs of the child with a disability.
- 31. **Transition Services**-Specific planning in school that helps to prepare students with disabilities to participate more effectively in higher education or job training, community participation, independent living, continuing and adult education, and employment when they leave school.
- 32. **Visual perception**-The ability to notice and understand important details needed for reading and writing.
